Volunteers Make Long-Term Impacts on Students

ur volunteers have a lasting positive effect on students' lives, but it can be hard on a daily basis to see that you're making a difference for your student. Here are two examples that show that our tutors' and mentors' positive influence lasts longer than you might realize.

Craig Goldman, Superintendent of the Mountain View Whisman School District, shares the following story that begins back when he was still a Principal:

"Eduardo was a first grader at Huff School where I served as Principal. His father and

mother didn't speak English and neither did Eduardo when he first started school.

He was a bright and enthusiastic boy, but as time passed I learned that Eduardo was having a difficult time learning to speak English and to read. The more challenging school became, the more his enthusiasm waivered, and the more he started to get into trouble.

Eduardo's teacher sought the support of (then) PNG, which assigned a tutor to work with him. I remember seeing him regularly with books under his arm ready to meet with his tutor, and after a few months, his contagious smile and enthusiasm returned.

Eduardo continued to struggle with reading, but, through the help of his

tutor, he made steady progress and slowly gained fluency and confidence. He started to think of himself as a capable and successful student.

Over the years, there were a lot of bad influ-

ences in Eduardo's life, but I believe that being part of a caring community and feeling successful gave him the ability to resist the pressures of local gangs and to keep his focus on getting the most out of his education.

I ran into Eduardo this past summer. He's a junior in high school and told me he's doing well in school and plans to attend Foothill when he graduates. He has matured and his voice has deepened, but I could still see the smiling little boy who carried his reading books to meet with his tutor.

If you have been a tutor, I want to say thank you. You not only change lives, you save them, too."




