ttendees at MTC's Oktoberfest on October 18 heard from Wendy Alas, San Jose State student, and her former mentor, Hilda Chan. They were matched by MTC when Wendy was a sophomore at Mountain View High School in 2019 and continue their close relationship now that Wendy is in college.

Their relationship is based on shared time together and trying new things.

From Wendy trying sushi to Hilda trying pupusas, they enjoyed introducing each other to new experiences. "I treasure the opportunity that I was able to expose her to new things," Hilda says, "and she exposed me to new things as well."

Wendy is now a freshman at San Jose State. She, like her mentor Hilda, is the first in her family to attend a US college. Sharing this experience with each other helped Wendy feel motivated and supported. She says, "I really appreciate her. We have a connection, and even though we are out of the program now, I feel like I can call or text her any time."

Hilda values the unique relationship a mentor has with their mentee. She says, "We're mentors, we're not parents. And that's nice for me, and nice for her. I don't come with the expectations that a parent would have for their kids. I was able to just be by her side, show up for her regularly, and maybe give her some ideas to try." Hilda is proud of Wendy and happy to help her chart her path beyond high school. But mostly, she says, "I am there to help Wendy just be Wendy."

Speaking the Same Language

n November 8, 2020, I met a wonderful sophomore at Los Altos High School named Ingrid. Soon after, I met her mom when picking her up for our weekly get togethers. Both Ingrid and her mom were shy, a bit distant, and quiet. I decided to switch gears and speak in Spanish which is my

first language. I noticed Ingrid's mom's face softened, she smiled, and immediately we felt a connection.

In the past almost two years, Ingrid and I have had in depth conversations about what it is like growing up in an immigrant household where one language is spoken at home and another at school and with friends. We have laughed, we have cried, and we have grown to understand and support each other. We have explored art



museums, gone hiking, and have had many Starbucks runs.

Last week I had the unique opportunity of talking with Ingrid's mom briefly one-on-one in Spanish. She thanked me and said her daughter is a new, different person who is confident and indepen-

dent. I feel honored to be allowed to be a part of Ingrid's life and her family's life.

As a new Board member, I am excited about MTC's priority to recruit from new avenues to reach potential bilingual volunteers. Speaking the same language helps to feel connected and fosters trust. Many local students would benefit from a mentor or a tutor who also speaks Spanish. I enjoy giving back to the community, but I did not realize how much I would benefit!

THE IMPACT OF MENTORS*

95% of our mentees reported positive outcomes on at least 3 of 4 critical indicators:

- I know my mentor really cares about me
- My mentor helps me think through my plans for the future
- Because of having my mentor, I feel more positive about the person I am
- Because of having my mentor, I feel less stress

WHERE WE WORK

MTC volunteers are in 17 schools in the three MV and LA districts.

THE IMPACT OF TUTORS*

- 100% of teachers working with MTC thought that the tutors supporting their students were effective.
- 93% of 4th through 8th graders indicated it was helpful to meet with a tutor
